Description

SARCSems introduce 1st year School of Architecture students at UVA both to the intellectual *and* experiential aspects of our school. Toward that end, we will meet weekly either to explore a significant theme in the constructed environment – sense of place – or to learn about tools, resources, and issues relevant to life as a SARC student. Foremost, our SARCSem is a space to get comfortable with the people, ideas, and experiences that structure life in SARC, whether you ultimately think of yourself as a designer, planner, or historian and critic of places.

Intellectually, we will explore the idea that places – buildings, landscapes, neighborhoods, and more – can be invested with personal or social meaning. How do the actions of designers and planners influence the perceptions and choices of users? We will look at historic and contemporary examples of how sense of place has been conveyed in design, as well as the concepts and methods we can use to understand the values imbued in a place.

Class Requirements

Whether we are focusing on our topic or learning about SARC and the University, the key requirement is that you come to class, either in the Rotunda or alternate locations. In addition, you will have a series of short writing assignments to reflect on the readings assigned during some weeks.

Readings and Reflection Assignment

Readings will be uploaded to the Collab website for our class, under the Resources tab. The course Schedule, below, describes when readings should be completed. For each week that we have readings, you should write a short personal reflection on these readings. The goal is for you to think about the implications of the readings, the major insights you've gotten from them, and the issues they raise. Reflections should be no more than three hundred words. You don't need to overly worry about format, just try to write clearly. Your reflections should be printed out and brought to class to aid in our group discussion for that day's topic.

Grading

This is a graded course, and your grade will be based on attendance (50% of grade), participation (20%), and completing the reading responses (30%).

Laptop Policy

Laptops are not allowed during the class time, nor are smartphones and tablets, without explicit permission. Our classes are an opportunity for discussion and to get to know one another.
