


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Welcome from Leadership

Sally Hemings, Dolley Madison, & Anastasia **Three Central Virginia Women**

The OLLI Winter Session at Michie Tavern is a time-honored Charlottesville tradition. Now OLLI at UVA continues its Michie Tavern partnership by offering another lunch-and-lecture series. Join us as we learn, sip, and socialize in Central Virginia's most beautiful and historic eatery!

The OLLI Michie Tavern Winter Session features a series of three talks—cumulatively titled "Enchanted, Empowered, & Enslaved"—presented by award winning local historian Rick Britton on three Thursdays: January 11th, 25th, & February 8th.

It's often said that "central Virginia history is indeed American history," and this trio of ladies certainly proves the point—they're well-known all across the United States. During the twentieth century, few life stories captured more attention than Anastasia's. And this local resident–portrayed on the silver screen by Ingrid Bergman—had answers to all of the world's most burning questions: How had she escaped the Bolshevik firing squad? How had she escaped civil war-torn Russia? By contrast, Dolley Madison—our nation's first First Lady—was everything she appeared to be: well-educated, extremely caring and gracious, and extremely devoted to her husband, the principal framer of the US Constitution, James Madison. But was her life always so perfect? During Thomas Jefferson's first presidential term, a Richmond newspaper piece stunned the nation, stating that Sally Hemings, an enslaved African American, was Jefferson's "concubine." His descendants—and many prominent Jefferson historians—at first denied that any such "relationship" had ever existed. A 1998 DNA study, however, found a link between the Hemings and Jefferson families. What are the facts of this fascinating story? How have certain aspects been exaggerated?

Speaking of Rivers Tour with Horace Scruggs

Rivers have always been vital to the development and commerce of many civilizations throughout history. And through much of the history of America this has included the labor and invention of both free and enslaved African Americans. With the personal stories at the forefront, this Rivanna River float will enlighten paddlers of the experiences and contributions African Americans had on Central Virginia's rivers. This will include discussions on the American slave trade, local plantations, bateau and watermen, and canal workers. Come learn how African Americans navigated the river as well as the societal pressures of their times.

This beginner-friendly half-day trip introduces participants to the rural beauty of Fluvanna County. While there are numerous riffles and a few very small Class 1 rapids, the majority of the trip is placid water over pebble, rock and sand bottom. In the summer, the water is low and clear, and inviting for swimming, snorkeling, wading, and fish watching. Numerous pebble beaches and sunny rocks make good places to break, swim and snack.

At typical summer water levels, expect the trip to take from 3-3.5 hours at a leisurely pace. If the Rivanna River level is too low the float will take place on the James River.

Military Aviation Museum

Located in Virginia Beach, the Military Aviation Museum is home to one of the world's largest collections of vintage military aircraft.

Founded in 2008 by a Virginia Beach businessman, the purpose-built airport facility includes over 70 aircraft – most of which are in flying condition - from the World War I and World War II-era. Located on 130 acres, the museum includes a 5,000 ft. grass runway, and is home to an original WWII control tower, a German WWII aircraft hangar, a period authentic WWI hangar (which houses the WWI collection) and two WWII type hangars in the main museum. The WWII collection includes a P-51 Mustang, a FG-1D Corsair, a Mk IX Spitfire, a German Bf-109, a B-25 Mitchell, and a PBY Catalina. The WWI collection includes an original Curtiss JN-4D Jenny, a Fokker DR-1 Triplane, a Fokker D-VII, a Nieuport 17, and a Sopwith 1 ½ Strutter.

Join OLLI at UVA for a spring day trip to the Anne Spencer Museum and Gardens historic Lynchburg, Virginia. The Anne Spencer House & Garden Museum is the former home of renowned Harlem Renaissance poet Anne Spencer and is named a Virginia Landmark on the National Register of Historic Places. With up to 95% of the original house and cottage furnishings still in place today, it is considered one of the most intact house museums in the United States. Anne Spencer's garden is also the only known restored garden of an African American in the United States. Anne Spencer was a poet, civil rights leader, advocate, and librarian. Her home and garden served as a gathering place for leading African Americans such as W.E.B. Du Bois, Zora Neale Hurston, Langston Hughes, and Martin Luther King, Jr. The garden served as a private space of reflection and inspiration for the poet as well as a social realm for family and friends. W.E.B. Du Bois, James Weldon Johnson and George Washington Carver were plantsmen. Pack a lunch and join your friends for a wonderful spring excursion and picnic.

Staunton Spirits: exploring local ghost stories

Join local author and ethno-historian, Dr. Lynn Rainville, as she shares centuries of local ghost stories. This illustrated talk reveals the backstories behind historic Haunts in central Virginia and the sites associated with their hauntings.

After earning her PhD in Near Eastern Archaeology, Lynn Rainville has spent the last two decades as a Public Historian, studying Virginia's historic cemeteries, enslaved communities, segregated schools, poor farms, and its role in World War I. Her grant-funded research has produced numerous articles and books, including Hidden History: African American Cemeteries in Virginia; Sweet Briar College; Virginia and the Great War; Invisible Founders: How Two Centuries of African American Families Transformed a Plantation into a College. Today she works as an historic consultant on Virginian history and culture.


Descendant Community Work and Historic Preservation

Niya Bates and Muriel Miller Branch will speak about descendant community work and historic preservation. Branch is the founder of the AMMD Pine Grove Project and Bates is on the historic and preservation committee of the AMMD Pine Grove Project in Cumberland County, which is leveraging historic preservation as a tool to combat environmental racism in the form of a megalandfill that is threatening a historically Black Tuskegee Rosenwald school and its associated rural neighborhood. Bates and Branch will guide participants through a virtual 3D tour of the school that was produced by Virginia Humanities and facilitate a discussion about the biggest issues facing Pine Grove and other Black rural communities in central Virginia.

Muriel Miller Branch is the founder of AMMD Pine Grove Project, a two-time graduate of Virginia State University, author, and retired educator. 

What It Was: Growing Up When the Music Mattered with James Pagliasotti

Not coincidentally, it coincided with a brief period of artistic freedom in commercial radio as well, which connected the artists with the audience and unleased an era of astonishing innovation. This is one person's look at What It Was and Why It Mattered.

James Pagliasotti was the first rock 'n' roll columnist for The Denver Post, where he covered music and the counterculture from 1968-74. He worked on-air for two freeform radio stations, has written for Rolling Stone magazine and numerous other publications, created www. radicalradio.media website, and is the author of three books.

Terry focuses on American history, leadership, ethics and decision making. He was Dean of the Federal Executive Institute. The process of photography offers individuals with many potential decisions that must be made in the process of capturing a quality image. There are technical decisions that are critical to the quality of the photograph, such as focus, sharpness and depth of field, as well as the exposure triangle of ISO, shutter speed and aperture. There are also aesthetic decisions less technical in nature that truly makes the difference in one's effort to capture a dramatic and interesting image that attracts the viewer. Examples of the aesthetic decisions include choice of subject matter, timing, composition, quality of light, and angle of view.

This three-day workshop will provide the participants with the opportunity to learn how to improve their decision-making skills resulting in stronger, more dramatic images. Notes: The instructor will have material prepared that can be shared with participants in advance to help prepare them for the class. Each participant shall have access to a digital camera to use during the class on Saturday afternoon.

Ben Greenberg, a lifelong resident of Virginia, has photographed scenic locations throughout the nation for fifty-three years. Having won local and national competitions and awards, his dramatic images reflect his uncompromising commitment to capturing the natural beauty of his subjects. Gothic and Medieval Revivals in America and Europe: 18th-20th Centuries

Choices Americans faced in dealing with the crisis were dramatized by disagreements between President Hoover and the incoming President, Roosevelt. The "Fifties didn't truly end until 1965. Topics to be explored are the draft, military training, arrival in Vietnam, the daily existence of combat troops, tactics, the Vietnamese, death, coming home, and the impact of combat on one's life. Additionally, we will discuss the similarities of Vietnam and Afghanistan. Videos will be utilized that are graphic, contain harsh language and generate strong emotions.

Bob is a retired Healthcare executive who in 1968 served as an infantry platoon leader in the Marine Corps' 1st Division located in I Corps around Danang. He participated in large and small unit combat operations as well as counterinsurgency efforts. For the past ten years he has networked with his fellow lieutenants to try to gain an understanding of their experiences in Vietnam.

The Life and Times of J. Robert Oppenheimer

Last summer's epic film, "Oppenheimer," provided viewers a glimpse into the enigmatic figure of the scientist credited with the development of the atomic bomb. This course will explore Oppenheimer's complex character, scientific prowess, management skills, and interactions with the US government. It follows his path from a disturbed, prodigious student, to a charismatic professor and laboratory director, and finally to his dramatic Atomic Energy Commission hearing in 1954. These events combine to portray J. Robert Oppenheimer as the protagonist in a Shakespearian tragedy.

Frank A. Settle, Jr. received a bachelor's degree in chemistry from Emory and Henry College and a doctoral degree in chemistry from the University of Tennessee, Knoxville. A professor emeritus of chemistry at Washington and Lee University and former director of the Alsos Digital Library for Nuclear Issues, Settle was professor of chemistry at the Virginia Military Institute from 1964 to 1992. He is the author of General George C. Marshall and the Atomic Bomb (ABC-CLIO, 2016). He also authored a chapter titled "To Harness Atomic Power; Marshall and Nuclear Weapons" in George C. Marshall and the Early Cold War: Politics, Policy and Society, edited by William Taylor (Oklahoma University Press, 2020).

Is it best for freelancers to email or snail-mail queries? How can a first-time writer break in? Should a writer send a query or a completed manuscript? What do editors want to see in a query? How much of the article should be included? How do writers know the appropriate editor for their article? Which section of a publication is the best place for newcomers to break in? Is it okay for a freelancer to call an editor if the story is timely? How long should a writer wait to hear from an editor before she sends her query elsewhere? Do editors ever steal ideas from rejected queries? How can writers figure out hot topics? Do editors have a stable of freelancers upon whom they depend? How can a writer become a regular contributor?

Judy Mandell is a freelance writer based in North Garden. Fire and Ice: The Geologic History of **Yellowstone National Park**

Yellowstone's geology is one-of-a-kind on this planet. In this course we will start with a brief review of minerals, rocks, plate tectonics, and the geologic time scale. We will then cover the depositional and tectonic history of the park before moving on to its more spectacular recent geology including its early volcanic activity, the origin and movement of the Yellowstone hotspot, the formation of the Yellowstone caldera and its history of mega-eruptions, the huge magma chamber presently under the caldera and the concern for a future eruption. We will also cover the glacial history and deposits at Yellowstone, the many hydrothermal features of Yellowstone including geysers, fumaroles, and mudpots, as well as geohazards such as hydrothermal explosions and earthquakes, and much more. No prior geology is required but helpful..

Geology Beneath Your Feet and in Your Future

Earth materials provide virtually all the resources, other than plant materials, that humans directly use every day. Rocks and minerals provide metals, sand and gravel, cement, soils, and control where water is stored and flows. Fossil fuels (oil, natural gas, and coal from really old plant material) are found in rocks in unique locations and with unique histories. Further, the geologic history of earth materials shapes our landscape from the scale of global tectonic plates and entire continents to the hills in our Charlottesville neighborhoods. After all, how did the Blue Ridge get to be a ridge, anyway? This course will first provide a brief geologic history of Virginia (about one billion years will be covered) showing how tectonic plates have crashed together to build major mountain chains, eroded, pulled apart, crashed again, and eroded again to create what we see today. The variability of Virginia geology will be contrasted with other parts of the U.S. and the world. With this background, we will then meet at the UVA Fontaine Research Park for a field trip to look at large blocks of major Virginia rock types in the "rock garden." Back in class, we will move on to a basic understanding of how the variability in earth materials is now more critical than ever. As the world transitions away from fossil fuels, we will need more lithium, nickel, and cobalt for batteries, copper and aluminum for motors, wind turbines, and thousands of miles of new power lines, and rare earths for magnets. Where is all this stuff going to come from? What are the trade-offs in mining that we face? With this course you will now appreciate that this material is where it is because of geologic history, and the politics of access and extraction are not simple issues.

*Participants will need to provide their own transportation for the field trip and an alternate date will be set in case of rain.

Dr. Robert Finley is a retired (2015) research geologist who has specialized in energy resources research and in geological storage of carbon dioxide as a response to climate change. He received a PhD in geology from the University of South Carolina. Rob carried out his research career at the state geological surveys associated with The University of Texas at Austin and the University of Illinois.

We live in a golden age of science, generally, and of astronomy in particular. This course will examine the contours of that golden age by studying selected important astronomical discoveries of our time. We will place those discoveries in the context of an emerging view of the universe and of our place in it. Along the way, we will also consider a variety of instruments and methods that make possible today's discoveries. We will conclude by considering the place of humanity in an immense and expanding universe. The specific discoveries to be examined will be dictated by the pace and nature of ongoing discoveries. Please understand that the focus of this course is on the important discoveries of our time. Therefore, we will not conduct any outdoor observing sessions. The discoveries we will consider involve techniques and instruments far

beyond the capacity of instruments available to us. The telescope at the Mc Cormick Observatory operated by UVA is a magnificent instrument designed by a great man, Alvan Clark. It is historically important. But it is not relevant to the subject matter of this course, and we will not be observing through it.

Charlie is a retired attorney and a lifelong amateur astronomer, who has observed the skies since the age of twelve. He has observed the heavens through a variety of telescopes which he operated in a small personal observatory for many years. He has taught several courses for OLLI on astronomical and other topics over a period of seven years. He has published short articles dealing with astronomical and scientific topics in Natural History magazine.

This course will examine the basic beliefs and practices of Islam, the second largest religion in the world today. Our focus will be on the most universal traditions (the "Five Pillars"), but we will also consider the major differences between Islam's major branches (Sunni, Shi'ite and Sufi) and the various ways the "sixth pillar," Sharia, has been developed. Some comparison with other faith traditions will be considered briefly, including both shared and conflicting beliefs and practices. You might be surprised how much overlap there is between Christianity, Judaism and Islam!

Recommended Reading: The shortest introduction is Islam: A Very Short Introduction, by Malise Ruthven (Oxford UP paperback). For more depth, you might consider Karen Armstrong's Islam: A Short History, or Reza Aslan's No god but God (with the advantage of offering a Muslim's perspective). No reading is assumed, but any will be helpful! The class will have an opportunity to decide whether or not to visit a nearby mosque together.

Ken is a native of Findlay, Ohio. His education includes a BA in Psychology and Philosophy from Wittenberg U (in Ohio) and both Masters and Doctoral degrees in Theology from Boston University. He has basically had two 20-year careers, first as a pastor in the United Methodist Church and then as a professor of Philosophy and Religion, mostly at Mary Baldwin but including parttime teaching at both James Madison and UVA, two community colleges, and two seminaries. He has taught face to face courses for OLLI and does occasional preaching and pastoral duties. His wife of 55 years, Jackie, also taught at Mary Baldwin (Biology) before taking on her "second career" as a science writer. They have two married children: Eve, a clinical psychologist in Saint John, New Brunswick, Canada, and Kurt, a professor of German Studies at University of Richmond beginning this fall. This course will take a revised look at their achievements and failures, both real and imagined, and a broader look at their impact on their respective countries and the world, both during and outside their terms in office.

Carl Pales has a BA in International Studies/Russian Studies from GMU and a Master's Degree from the Defense Intelligence College. He served as foreign ground force intelligence analyst covering various regions from 1986-2019, including nine years as a Senior Intelligence Officer. He deployed to conflict areas twice as civilian.
